- Sec 320 of the John S. McCain National Defense Authorization Act for FY 2019

WHY IT MATTERS

- Fort Knox is the only installation in the Army that is energy independent capable.
- This makes Fort Knox ideal for additional military missions where energy security is especially critical – e.g. data centers, organizations with large IT infrastructure.
- It allows Fort Knox, KRDA and others to showcase the program, creating a competitive advantage for mission growth.

- The academy creates a talent pipeline to fill the +250 open IT positions for Fort Knox, making it more competitive for additional missions.
- The academy provides an opportunity to retain local talent.
- The availability of certified IT professionals can serve as valuable business attraction tool beyond Fort Knox.

Advocating for the Army to acquire Crestwood Subterranean Complex as part of Fort Knox's training area



- A former rock quarry northeast of Fort Knox in Oldham County, Crestwood provides five million square feet of underground training area.
- Subterranean training is becoming increasingly critical given our enemies affinity for using underground complexes to conduct operations and avoid detection.

- Crestwood has the potential to become the Department of Defense's premiere subterranean training complex for special operations units and conventional forces.
- This would raise Fort Knox's strategic value to the Department of Defense.
- This would attract hundreds if not thousands of additional Soldiers to Fort Knox and Crestwood for training and create additional jobs.
